We are in the middle of the most valuable learning time of the year. Between January and March, classes cover a lot of ground. There are very few holidays and kids generally stay focused. These months are good months to spend 15 minutes or so reading each night with your children, or for older students, having them read silently for 30 minutes. Many families are already doing this.

Self-regulation is a big focus in our school this year.

It's important that children know how to calm themselves first in order to self-regulate. A preferred strategy of calming must be practiced regularly, so like a habit it can be used when most needed. A child with good self-regulation knows:

Step 1: What it looks like to be calmly focused and alert.

Step 2: How to recognize stressors and how to return to the optimal state of regulation.

Enhancing a child's ability to regulate him or herself has a dramatic impact, not only on the child's wellbeing and capacity to learn, but an equally dramatic impact on the wellbeing of parents and educators: www.self-regulation.ca

Self-regulation is quite different than compliance, as self-regulation builds capacity in the child for self-direction and to cope with stressors. Self-regulation can be defined as the ability to stay calmly focused and alert, which often involves, but cannot be reduced to self-control. It involves arousal states, emotions, behaviour, and as the child grows older, thinking skills.

As parents, we have an important role to play in the development of self-regulation in our children. The concept of co-regulation is that regulatory skills are first learned through others, and then internalized by self. This point to the importance of adults to be regulated themselves before they can help children regulate. We need to teach ourselves how to be calm and not react, and we do that through learning what our stressors are so that we can find the tools to allow us to cope more effectively rather than react when we are triggered.

Violence Threat Risk Assessment Notification to Parents

Re: Yukon Education Violence Threat Risk Assessment Protocol

Dear Parents/Guardians:

The safety of our children is a top priority for everyone. The tragedies that have occurred where students commit violent acts against other students and educators in Canada and in the United States have caused government officials, educators, parents, students and other community members to assess how we make our schools and communities safe for our children and students.

Public Schools Branch staff members have been involved in an intensive safety training program with our community partners, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Yukon Department of Health and Social Services, Yukon Department of Justice, and Yukon College. From what we have learned in this training we know that student acts of violence are not random; individuals do not suddenly 'snap' and commit serious acts of violence. In cases where serious acts of violence have occurred there have been many indicators and escalating signs that these individuals are on a path to commit serious harm to themselves or others. The training has helped our professionals to recognize these signs, assess them, and put in place interventions to support and reduce the level of risk. Together with our community partners, Public Schools Branch has developed a plan to respond to situations in which students may be demonstrating behaviours that pose a risk to themselves or others.

We wish to advise parents that we have adopted a protocol which requires schools to undertake a threat assessment in all cases of students making threats to harm others. These threats may be physical, verbal or written, they may be gestures or messages posted on the Internet. The purpose of the Yukon Education Violence Threat Risk Assessment Protocol is to determine how best to support students considered at risk so that their behaviour does not become hurtful or destructive to themselves or others.

The complete Yukon Education Violence Threat Risk Assessment Protocol is available at www.education.gov.yk.ca. Parents can play an active role in keeping our schools safe by advising the school of any information communicated to them from their children concerning threatening behaviours that their children may have been subjected to, in or out of school, and continuously monitoring their children's use of the Internet and Internet chat lines.

This letter is intended to provide you with notice that all Yukon schools will respond to all threats in a professional manner that provides for safe, healthy, and caring learning environments. Any threats or threat making behaviours will be taken seriously and assessed accordingly.

We are pleased to be able to provide this level of support to our school communities and appreciate having the ongoing support of our community partners.

Whitehorse Kindergarten pre-registration for the 2016-17 school year begins on **February 8, 2016, at 9 a.m.**

Kindergarten is not a required program in Yukon, but most families choose to start their children's education there.

Kindergarten in Whitehorse

In Whitehorse, children can start Kindergarten when they have reached 4 years + 8 months of age by September 1st of the school year. That is, they must be 5 years old on or before December 31.

Kindergarten in Whitehorse is a full-day program.

In addition to the regular English-language Kindergarten program, Whitehorse parents can choose French Immersion and Catholic education. Admission into these programs is not quaranteed.

Registration

Fill out the online Whitehorse Kindergarten pre-registration form

We use the form to assign children to schools.

The form asks for information about your child and allows you to specify your first and second program choices. Children are expected to attend school in their attendance area. Admission into French Immersion and Catholic education is not guaranteed.

School assignment

Children are assigned to schools in the order in which pre-registration forms are received, so it is very important to complete the online form as soon as the pre-registration period opens in early February, especially if you are requesting French Immersion or Catholic education.

In assigning children to schools, we consider:

- Parents' requests for special programs
- Class sizes
- Attendance areas
- Schools attended by siblings
- Support for any special educational needs child may have

The pre-registration form allows you to specify a first and second preference. If your first-choice school is full, your child will be assigned to an alternative school, taking into account your second preference.

Completing the registration process

When we have processed all of the pre-registration forms, we will tell you which school your child has been assigned to.

Once your child has been assigned to a school, the school will ask you to show a birth certificate or other proof of age for your child, and you will fill out some additional forms.

The school will give you a list of required school supplies and invite you to an orientation session.

If you have requested a school outside your attendance area, we will advise you no later than May 1 whether or not your request is approved. In the meantime, a spot will be held at the school in your attendance area or at an alternative school.





